

Letter from the Abbot



In Chapter 48 of the Rule, St Benedict writes "for then are they truly monks, when they live by the work of their own hands, as did our fathers and the apostles." In the first chapter of the Rule, St Benedict describes four kinds of monks. In his estimation, those who live in community with a vow of stability, who gather to pray and who support themselves by their own labor are the best. Hence, the unofficial motto of Benedictines, ora et labora – prayer and work.

To pray daily, to advance in grace before God, monks needed books. Illustrations of monks laboriously copying texts by hand populate all manner of books about monastic life. When much of Europe plunged into disarray following barbarian invasions, Benedictine monasteries were instrumental in the recovery from the Dark Ages. Books could be found there. Mount Michael sails in the wake of the tradition of Benedictine monks providing education for the young.

Throughout its existence, Mount Michael has relied on the generosity of donors to make its apostolate of education a reality. An article which appeared on CNN's news page reported that Cabrini University, a small Catholic liberal arts college in Pennsylvania was forced to close. Cabrini was one of a growing number of US colleges and universities facing financial strain – often due to increasing operating costs, inadequate fund raising and declining enrollment. Challenges with which we are familiar.

When monks from Conception Abbey first came to the Omaha area, they were given land near Elkhorn by Rex Olson, a local businessman who had planned to retire to a farm he appropriately named Journey's End. The school could not have been built without his gift. As Omaha has grown to envelop the Elkhorn area, land values have risen. Mr. Olson's gift is worth many times what it must have been when he donated it.

Some years ago, I received a phone call one day from Nancy Arp, a name I did not recognize. She said that she represented an Omaha man who had died. His name was Harvey Decker, another name I did not recognize. Harvey and his wife Lucille had left a gift to the monastery from their estate. Nancy wanted to stop by the next day to leave a check. As it happened, I had a full schedule the next day but told her that I could steal a few minutes in the morning. With nothing to go on, I guessed that the check would range in the thousands of dollars. Or if we were quite fortunate, it might be in the tens of thousands of dollars. Just as I was leaving the next day, Nancy arrived and handed me the check. I could hardly conceal my shock. The check was for more than four hundred thousand dollars.

In the decade of the 90s, a small religious group took root in Des Moines. Desiring a recognized monastic way of life, that group associated itself with Mount Michael Abbey. Among the monks from that group that eventually made its way to Mount Michael was Br Patrick Harris. Br Patrick died a few years ago. His siblings had also passed away. But his mother, Jeane Knapp, outlived all her children. In 1942, she had married Dr Dale Harris. He served as a medical officer in the U.S. Navy for five years. Dr. Harris was a surgeon on the U.S.S. St. Louis when Pearl Harbor was bombed. Jeane was on Oahu then, and she and her husband survived the bombing. Despite having to bury all her children, it was noted in her obituary that she "will always be remembered for her spirited and fun-loving outlook on life. She was positive, optimistic, adventurous, and always willing to try new things. Her resilience was inspiring to all. When asked her secret to longevity, she replied, 'enjoying people!" She genuinely loved everyone around her, and her love was felt deeply by her family and



friends. Even though her son had only been a member of Mount Michael Abbey for a brief time, she left the monastery with a gift of one hundred and forty thousand dollars.

Roughly two years ago, a woman named Sally Stancavage came along with friends to visit the guest house Br Jerome uses to host a variety of groups. Sally's father headed the creation of a massive Western Electric plant built in 1958 near Millard to produce dial equipment and telephone cable. Sally herself was a long-time employee of the facility. Sally returned to Br Jerome's guest house to attend some retreats. She heard the story of Maurus and Placid, two young boys entrusted to St Benedict for education. Sally was so impressed with the story and with Br Jerome, that she decided to leave a memorial in the name of the Stancavage family to help those in need receive a Benedictine education. She had initially intended to leave her estate to another religious group. Without any suggestion from Br Jerome, she completely re-wrote her will. When she died, she left the monastery and school assets worth over a million dollars.

I recount these stories because we have been blessed throughout our history with generous donors. Although many monks have worked long, hard hours to forge a home at Mount Michael Abbey and School, none of it would happened without the support of donors. To borrow words from the Rule, we try to treat all gifts, whether material or spiritual, as vessels of the altar.

I am never sure from what direction the next unexpected gift might come. We hope to continue educating young men into the future. Europe owed its emergence from the Dark Ages to Benedictine monasteries which preserved books needed for education; monasteries that trained youth to assume positions of influence and responsibility. Mount Michael wants to continue producing leaders for our church and our society. We will work and pray to make that a reality. But a little help along the way is certainly needed and always welcome.

HEAD OF SCHOOL:

At Mount Michael Benedictine School, we are blessed to have members of our monastic community still in the classroom leading, teaching, and educating our young men.

Abbot Michael Liebl, OSB, teaches two courses every day. These courses are reserved for our upper classmen. One is AP (advanced placement) Calculus I and the other class is Honors Physics. The Honors Physics course is taught in conjunction with Creighton University and is a dual enrollment course. The students in that class receive university credit for the course from Creighton. The AP Calculus course culminates in an AP exam given at the end of the school year in May. Abbot Michael has been teaching at Mount Michael since the fall of 1977. He was a seminary student when we were St. John Vianny minor seminary and graduated from the high school in 1968. He has impacted a tremendous number of our alumni over the years. He holds a BS degree from Creighton University, an MA from St. John's University, and an MS from the University of Massachusetts Amherst. Abbot Michael holds certification to teach Mathematics, Chemistry and Physics in the state of Nebraska.

Fr. Daniel Lenz, OSB, teaches five sections of Art here at Mount Michael. He has students at every grade level. Fr. Dan graduated from Mount Michael and attended Creighton University. He holds a BA degree from Creighton and an MA from St. John's University. He is certified to teach PK-12th Art and 7-12th Social Studies. Fr. Dan started teaching here in the fall of 1978.

Br. Luke Clinton, OSB, teaches three sections of Pottery each week to all grade levels at Mount Michael. There are four different class offerings from Pottery I through Pottery IV. Br. Luke is a graduate from Mount Michael. He holds a BA from Creighton University and graduate work from the University of Nebraska at Omaha. He is certified and







ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR Rev. Daniel Hendrickson, S.J., PhD, '89



After graduating from Mount Michael and attending Marquette University for his BA, Rev. Hendrickson returned to Mount Michael as a residential dean, yearbook advisor, and theology teacher. While teaching at Mount Michael it was noted that he was an exceptional young teacher who could

command the attention and respect of seniors despite his not being too much older than the seniors.

Rev. Hendrickson currently serves as the 25th president of Creighton University. His priorities since becoming president in 2015 include bolstering the role of humanities in higher education; embracing a global focus; and enlarging Creighton's health sciences educational reach. During Hendrickson's tenure, Creighton has seen enrollment grow to more than 8,700 undergraduate, graduate, and professional students; achieved greater national recognition; and opened a \$100 million health sciences campus in Phoenix, making it one of the largest Catholic health professions educators in the U.S. Creighton has also achieved recognition for undergraduate teaching, research, and internship opportunities. With Hendrickson's leadership, Creighton recently launched its most ambitious fundraising campaign, Forward Blue, to raise \$650 million in support of scholarships, campus improvements, and mission-driven services and programs.

Hendrickson's other achievements include authoring Jesuit Higher Education in a Secular Age: A Response to Charles Taylor and the Crisis of Fullness, published in 2022. The book explores the history and relevance of the liberal arts and humanities and how Jesuit education aids students' self-awareness, sense of global solidarity, and aptitude for inspiration, awe, and gratitude.

Rev. Hendrickson truly embodies what it means to be a Mount Michael graduate. He has excelled academically, been a conduit for advancing the minds of the younger generations, and a passionate advocate of the Catholic faith. We are honored to recognize him as our Alumnus of the Year.

ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE Coach John Gathje



John has been both a coach and teacher at Mount Michael since 1991, inspiring and helping students in the classroom and on the trails. In cross country, his teams have qualified for state 25 times with five third-place team finishes, three state runner-up finishes and six state titles. 3rd place 5 times, 3 times runners-up and 6

state titles! In addition to his team's success, he has coached over 35 top fifteen finishes. In track and field, Gathje has helped coach the sprinters, throwers, jumpers, middle distance and distance runners. He has had several athletes qualify for the state meet and numerous medal at the state meet including 5 school record holders and two all class gold medalists.

ALUMNI APPRECIATION AWARD **David Spenner '63**



For years, the Mount Michael School and Abbey kitchens were run by Dave Spenner. Dave joined the monastery after his graduation in 1963 and was assigned to work in the kitchen to oversee operations. He would leave the monastery only to return in the 80's to work in the kitchen again and was given the title Kitchen

Master. As Kitchen Master he would often work 12-14 hour days to make sure that all of the students and monastic community members have food. In addition to the long days, Dave had a very lean budget so he had to be creative and organized to make sure that he could provide all the food necessary for the Mount Michael Community.

As many alumni know, preparing and keeping everyone satisfied can be challenging. Dave not only kept the Mount Michael kitchen running for over 40 years, but he was always pleasant, open minded, and willing to change things to help make others happy. Upon retirement from the kitchen Dave continued to assist with the Fall Festival and mowing the grounds at Mount Michael. He is someone who truly gave their life to Mount Michael and he is incredibly deserving of this honor.

THE COLLINS DYNASTY

One of the consequences of having a background in Math and Science, as I do, is that I am always looking for ways to measure things, to quantify them. For example, should we measure my sons' experience at Mt. Michael in Wednesday Night Visits (roughly 480)? Miles driven to and from school (39,168)? Oh, I left out trips to activities. Shoot. Better double that estimate. Loads of laundry (about 1440)? Maybe we could think in terms of tuit-... umm, on second thought, better to leave that one un-thunk.

This is starting to sound like a Broadway musical. What would we call a musical about Mt. Michael? Maybe "Ment".

78,336 miles 78,336 miles, so dear 78,336 miles

How do you measure, measure a Mt. Michael career?

There are other numbers which are really important, as well. Perhaps we could think in terms of hours spent in class (30,000)? Or perhaps credits earned would be a better gauge (1400). As a college preparatory school, perhaps college credits would be a good measure (80)? Or since boys love to compete, sports seasons played (46)?

While it is fun to talk about the numbers, though, the things which really matter cannot be measured, cannot be quantified. The most important thing that my boys – and their parents and sisters – have gained is a sense of community. We have built lasting friendships, and we have become connected to a good, wholesome community which extends beyond what we would be able to reach on our own.

In addition to that, my boys have grown as men, have learned to be responsible for themselves, and to embrace the freedom which flows from that development. They have developed their sense of honor, learning to carry themselves in ways which will make the world around them better.

I can see the evidence of that. All five of them are in the midst of pursuing things they love to do, from nursing, to teaching, to continuing to play sports. Mt. Michael gave them opportunities to explore those things, and helped them find ways to work

their lifelong loves into their lives.

Seeing the last of our sons graduate from Mt. Michael this spring is going to have an impact on me and my wife. It is difficult for us to remember a time when we were not working to coordinate our schedules around Wednesdays and weekends. However, there is a lot of comfort for us in the knowledge that this is a chapter – well, maybe several chapters – in a larger story.

After all, my boys' father first fell in love with Mt. Michael during the Summer of 1979, during his first week of what was then called Camp St. John. I know it gives them a sense of pride to know they have expanded, have strengthened,

the bonds formed by me and their uncles. And I know they are eager to have their cousins, nephews, and sons continue to strengthen those bonds in the future.

I am sorry, Mt. Michael, but I am afraid you are stuck with Collinses forever.



From the time my son Michael, '12, spent his first night in the dorm as a freshman in August of 2008, he and his brothers – Jonathan, '15, Patrick, '19, Matthew, '21, and Daniel, '24, – have spent 16 continuous years out at Mt. Michael. That is a long time no matter what unit of measurement you use.



In late August and early September of 1982, beanie infractions were a 'big thing' at Mount Michael.

Though infractions were universally minor or, more often, completely fabricated – tilted, unclean or not worn as required for all freshmen at all times - punishment was swift and enforced enthusiastically by the Class of 1983, meted out in the form of creative decoration. There were beanie windmills, an oversized sombrero, a dunce cap, a jester cap complete with bells and many, many more. But when the time came for the big beanie bonfire, Bryan Strom's Mickey Mouse hat was nearly in mint condition, his first and last name still completely legible on the ears. Unphased and unbothered. Bryan Strom.

These many years later, when I think of Bryan, I think of that – unphased, unbothered and life being more about the 'journey' and not so much the 'destination'. Though an Eagle Scout and son of a federal judge, 'rule follower' does not come to mind. The youngest of seven, Bryan came to the Mount by way of St. Agnes and Sunset Hills in Omaha. In addition to the usual rigors of high school, Bryan was on the

speech and debate teams, played golf and tennis, and was selected MVP of the 1986 Suntanning Team. When I asked Bryan to reflect on that period, he said "It was a special time really, when I began to really find my voice as young adult. We all boarded back then, so there was a lot of time to ruminate on life's 'big questions' and it is where the person I have become began to take shape. I was an idiot back then, and I think many of my classmates can relate to that sentiment"

When I asked Bryan to consider the journey vs. destination question, he admitted "My path in life has been anything but straight." After high school, Bryan went to college to study literature, only to find his heart wasn't really in it. After two years of college, he took an extended leave of absence from school and spent 14 months traveling through Europe, including time working as a bar back sleeping above the London pub where, he says, his initial appreciation for Guinness was born. His winding path ultimately brought him back stateside where his curiosity led him to architectural school in Chicago. His post high school years included stents in North Carolina as a both a student and part time "Party Picture Man" as well as time in Omaha before venturing back to the U.K. where he has lived and worked as an architect for the past 20 years.

After working for different practices in London, Bryan started his own private firm in 2009, SLAB Architects (https://www.slabarchitects.com). Bryan's professional interests focus on sustainable building, the influence of Japanese and Scandinavian design, and working with small spaces – his fondness for the latter, he admits, may stem from his years in 'spacious' Mount Michael dormitory rooms. Bryan currently lives in South East London with his wife (Liz), twin boys (Alex and Lucas), and dog Ziggy (yes, named for Ziggy Stardust). In his spare time, he is a Parent Governor at his children's school, a Scout Leader, and he sits on the Children and Young Persons committee for Lewisham Council. Bryan likes to surf the brisk waters off the beaches in Cornwall and ski in the Alpes.

Living more than 4,000 miles away, staying connected with Mount Michael has posed a challenge although Bryan does his best to keep up with the Michaeleen. In September of 2022, several members of the class of 1986 - including Bryan - met in Dublin for the Nebraska-Northwestern football game. As it turned out, the reminiscing and fellowship in Dublin that extended through the night and into the early hours of the next morning went far better than the football.

As part of our email correspondence leading to this, Bryan said "So much has changed since we were at the Mount. I struggle to imagine what it is like having or being a day student or not having to wait hours to use one of the four student payphones in the Student Union to call home." Like other alumni, Bryan doesn't hesitate in identifying the lifelong relationships established, and friendships with classmates in particular, as a major selling point for parents considering Mount Michael for their sons.

During my time in high school,

I was able to establish some amazing
friendships. They have been my best
friends now for more than 40 years.

For me, these friendships have
been one of the most important
things in my life next to my family
and I have the Mount to thank for that.

latter for 12 years. President George W. Bush appointed him chair of the Advisory Board for an additional three years. None of this illustrious work was the reason for the award. While living in the DC area, Shannon Schieber, the daughter of Sylvester and his wife Vicki, was murdered. The person responsible was eventually tried and convicted. But both Sylvester and his wife refused to seek the death penalty. They have spent many years since campaigning to end capital punishment in states where it is still a possibility. The Lumen Vitae award was presented to Sylvester and Vicki for their untiring efforts to honor and preserve human life.



Each year, the Archdiocese of Omaha recognizes the priests who celebrate jubilees, Golden (50 years) and Silver (25 years). This year, Abbot Michael is pictured with six jubilarians: Fr. David Liewer, Fr. James Tiegs, Fr. Michael Gutgsell, Fr. Gerald Gonderinger, and Fr. Gerald Leise, all of whom graduated in 1966 from St. John Seminary (Mount Michael Benedictine).
